A Preface by Founder, Alexandra Doudera

As I reflect on 2024 and Saltwater Classroom's growth, I think of the ways in which we found our groove—delivering hands-on education, advancing Phase II, growing partnerships, strengthening our Board, and expanding events. I felt confident and energized—that is, until my world turned upside down. In mid-December, my father, Ed Doudera, unexpectedly passed away, leaving a gaping hole and jumbling my path forward. It is taking me time to regain my footing, but I am proud of our work this past year and am eager to share it with you. My dad would have gently nudged me about this report weeks ago!

As many of you know, my father had a tremendous impact on Saltwater Classroom and was an incredibly important presence in my life. Among many things, he instilled in my brothers and me a love for the natural world, of travel and culture, and encouraged my passions as a student. He played an integral role in Saltwater Classroom's early days—lending his expertise as an attorney while we incorporated as a 501(c)(3). As Board Treasurer, he dedicated countless hours, contributed ideas, raised thoughtful questions, and introduced others to our work. We corresponded almost daily, often about tasks to tackle or connections to make.

Undeniably, the beach was one of my dad's favorite places. As a child, his family took annual trips to Montauk, where my grandfather set up camp, lashing driftwood and rigging an army-style canvas tent—memories my dad often recalled. Throughout his life, whether walking the shoreline, collecting shells and shark teeth, reading with his toes in the sand, or body-surfing, he was perhaps his happiest by the ocean. In 1986, he and my mom settled in Camden, ME, kindling a deep connection to Penobscot Bay, where we spent time as a family sailing to nearby islands. A lifelong traveler, my dad was equally drawn to tropical beaches, remembering fondly and often daydreaming of St. Croix, the cayes of Belize, Baja California, and beyond.

Ever a dutiful Board member, my dad completed Saltwater Classroom's short survey about our connections to the ocean in October 2023. When asked to share his favorite aspect of the ocean, he succinctly wrote, "the peace that watching it brings". Now, as I grieve his passing, I take a breath of solace thinking of him living fully in that peace, and feel flooded with gratitude for the person, father, and ocean-lover that he was.

I invite you to continue on to explore our shared impact this past year. Wherever this note may find you, I thank you for your support of Saltwater Classroom and of our vision for a global community of lifelong learners connected and inspired by our planet's ocean. We're in this together, and for that I am grateful. Thank you.



Ocean Education in Action

Our in-person work this past year was marked by several key milestones. We kicked off 2024 with our fourth program at Costa Verde International School in Sayulita, Mexico. The relationships we've built in this small village feel stronger than ever, and we're eager to continue expanding our programming there. In April, our Saltwater Classroom team, along with videographer Austin Mills, traveled to Belize City for a weeklong program at St. Catherine Academy. With over 200 young girls participating, this was our largest program to date and an incredibly impactful experience. Following the program, we visited Ambergris Caye to connect with ocean experts, explore the local environment, and produce content for our online ocean literacy platform.

In Maine, we continued our hands-on ocean education with our second weeklong program at Friendship Village School, this time focusing on sustainable fisheries. We also ran a weeklong program on North Haven Island in collaboration with Waterman's Community Center. In September, we partnered with Cliff Island Elementary School to organize ocean education activities for students from small island schools along Maine's coast.









PHASE II: Online Ocean Literacy Platform

We have continued developing our innovative platform to expand ocean literacy, focusing on foundational software exploration, advancing design elements, and refining curriculum development.

Over the past year, our curriculum has grown through key content collaborations. We partnered with Rippleffect, a Portland, ME-based nonprofit dedicated to outdoor adventure and leadership, to integrate ocean education into their programming. Additionally, we collaborated with CLYNK to develop lessons on the circular economy, specifically around beverage redemption. We also collaborated with Nauti Sisters Sea Farm on lessons focused on diversity in oyster aquaculture and regenerative farming.

Looking ahead, we plan to expand our partnerships with other mission-aligned companies and nonprofits to further enrich our curriculum and broaden our impact. We will continue developing the platform, working toward a testable iteration with our first users, gathering valuable feedback, and refining the experience. These next steps will be instrumental in ensuring the platform is both engaging and effective in advancing ocean literacy.

Equitable Access to Ocean Education

A major goal of Phase II is to increase and diversify the reach of our curriculum by offering transformative learning experiences with reduced financial and geographic barriers. The accessible nature of our platform will help create a more diverse network of ocean-focused learners and problem solvers.

Hands-on Nature Learning

Through our tech-integrated approach, we aim to provide engaging and interactive activities that allow students to explore and connect with the marine environment, even if they are unable to physically visit the coast. Through virtual activities, real-life experiments, and interactive modules, we seek to create a dynamic and inclusive experience that fosters a deep connection to the ocean.

Blue Economy Workforce Development

We hope to increase interest among young learners in marine careers through heightened exposure to marine and STEM trades, as well as Blue Economy career pathways. The Saltwater Classroom Platform has the power to motivate a diverse generation of tenacious leaders in the ocean-driven workforce.

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
